Regis Jesuit High School is one school with two divisions—a Boys Division and a Girls Division offering a primarily single-sex academic experience. **We are not two separate schools**. Rooted in the nearly 500-year-old tradition of Ignatian education around the world, we are the only Jesuit high school in the United States to operate with this innovative model that combines the advantages of single-sex instruction with opportunities for young men and women to collaborate, serve, pray and socialize together on a shared campus.

Referencing the school as Regis Jesuit High School on first mention and Regis Jesuit, RJ or RJHS in subsequent usage is our communications standard. We appreciate all references to the name of the school follow this standard and not to be referred to as just Regis or Regis High School.

In terms of mascot, we are the Regis Jesuit Raiders, RJ Raiders or simply, the Raiders. We ask that you refrain from using the phrase Red Raiders, in reference to our teams or student groups. We also do not refer to our girls teams as Lady Raiders or Raiderettes.

Regis Jesuit®, the Crest and RJ logos are federally registered trademarks owned by Regis Jesuit High School. Regis Jesuit High School has reserved all rights to the use of our marks, including our unique name, school colors, mascot, mission statement, motto and all associated logos. These artifacts are intended for the strict use of Regis Jesuit only. Student Body Profile

Our student body is nearly 60% Catholic and more than 25% other Christian denominations with the remaining 15% being of a non-Christian faith tradition or unspecified. Approximately 30% of our student population is non-white with 13% being of Hispanic or Latino origin, 5.6% being Black or African American and 3.2% of Asian ancestry. The remaining students report as multi-racial, Native American or Pacific Islander. About 1% prefer not to disclose their ethnic background. Approximately 18% of our students have a diagnosed learning difference and are served by our Learning Services Program. Just over 42% of our students matriculate from Catholic primary schools. The other 58% attended a mix of public, charter, private or other school settings. Our students come to us from nearly 90 different zip codes across the Denver Metro

Admissions

Candidates take an entrance exam, complete the application for admission and provide the school with recommendations and transcripts. Candidates and their parents/guardians may also visit campus for programming and tours at one of our Experience RJ Days during the fall and attend a variety of other virtual and inperson events for Future Raiders.

Tuition & Fees

Tuition for the 2023-24 academic year is \$21,960 for sophomores through seniors and includes the cost of books and common fees. Tuition for freshman students is \$23,605 and includes a laptop computer, graphic calculator and immersion experience along with the cost of books and common fees. Incoming students pay a \$400 registration fee, which is then credited toward tuition.

Financial Aid Program

Regis Jesuit has awarded nearly \$7.5 million in financial aid, serving nearly one in three students, for the 2023-24 school year. The average aid grant is more than \$13,900 or approximately 63% of the cost of tuition. Additionally, families can apply for help with costs beyond what is covered in tuition through the Raider Opportunity Fund.

Formation Programs

Our formation uses a multi-faceted approach to foster spiritual and moral growth in Regis Jesuit students that includes regular Masses and other liturgies, reconciliation, days of recollection, retreats, theological study, participation in service immersion, prayer and the completion of a Capstone Project senior year. Participation in the Immersion ϑ Solidarity and Retreat Programs is required of all students throughout their entire high school experience.

Athletics

We view our athletic program as part of our Ignatian approach to education—one that encourages our students to excel in all aspects of their lives and is focused on formation of the whole person. The field, court, pitch, pool and mat are all extensions of the classroom—critical thinking skills learned in class are leveraged in making game time decisions. Being part of a team fosters relationships beyond the academic realm. Regis Jesuit offers 30 athletic programs.



School Overview



Founded in 1877, Regis Jesuit High School is a Catholic, Jesuit, college preparatory high school serving young men and young women in grades 9-12. As the *only* school among the network of nearly 80 Jesuit pre-secondary and high schools in the United States offering single-sex education to BOTH young men and young women, Regis Jesuit is unique and innovative. We offer a primarily single-sex instructional experience, while providing opportunities for our students to collaborate, serve, pray and socialize together on a shared campus. One of the defining characteristics of a Jesuit school is that it provides more than education, but formation as well. The hallmark of Jesuit education is *cura personalis*—the care and concern for the individual. Regis Jesuit High School engenders that by providing a student-centered environment in which each individual can grow intellectually, physically, socially, emotionally and spiritually.

Academically, Regis Jesuit offers honors classes and Advanced Placement courses, as well as numerous electives. The school has an alternating day block schedule with a total of eight periods offered over a two-day sequence. Students must be enrolled in at least seven courses each semester. An special eighth period is added several times a month in which students participate in the advisory program, student activities, religious services and other pastoral and enrichment activities. Athletic and co-curricular activities offer many opportunities for character and leadership development, fun and friendship. Regis Jesuit offers a safe and supportive environment that encourages students to get involved. It is an atmosphere in which students can find positive peer pressure by surrounding themselves with people who both care deeply about them and will challenge and help them to excel.

The school operates on a beautiful 85-acre expanse called Campbell Campus after a key alumnus and benefactor. The Boys Division and the Girls Division each have their own academic building with a full-size gym, multi-media library and chapel. Our campus also offers facilities shared by both boys and girls, including nine athletic fields, field house and pool, performing arts center, college counseling office, broadcast studio, student commons, ceramics lab and spacious grounds. During the 2023-24 school year, a new 65,000-square foot Science & Innovation Center will open that will also house operations for our admissions and alumni programs as well as serve as the school's front door. The campus feels like that of a small college with breathtaking views of the Rocky Mountains.

HIGHER EDUCATION

Last year, 99% of Regis Jesuit graduates were accepted to colleges and 98% went on to attend a two- or four-year instituition; 75% of these were out-of-state, 25% in-state, 56% enrolled in public schools and 44% in private schools. Nine students opted to take a gap year or were undecided in determining their next step following high school. Members of the Class of 2023 were admitted to more than 350 colleges and universities both in the U.S. and internationally and ultimately went on to attend 158 schools.



School History

Regis Jesuit High School traces its origins to Las Vegas College and was founded in 1877 in Las Vegas, New Mexico by Jesuits from Naples, Italy. In 1884, the Jesuits opened a second school in Morrison, Colorado. Four years later, at the invitation of J.P. Machebeuf, then bishop of Denver, the Las Vegas and Morrison schools were merged in the College of the Sacred Heart—which later became Regis College and then Regis University—and moved to West 52nd Avenue and Lowell Boulevard in northwest Denver.

In 1921, the high school and college were formally separated into two distinct entities. In 1979, they became separate corporations. With the completion of a new high school building on the college campus in 1984, Regis Jesuit High School moved out of the Regis University facilities, but soon outgrew that building as well. On September 16, 1989, the cornerstone was laid for the new campus in Aurora, Colorado. Classes began on the Campbell Campus the following September.

In January 1997, Regis Jesuit purchased an additional 35 acres adjacent to the original acreage in hopes of expanding the campus at some point. In 2001, the Board of Trustees, with the support of the Archdiocese of Denver, voted to open a second division of the school. The addition would offer the same high-quality, single-sex educational experience to young women as the school had offered young men since its inception. On April 11, 2003, ground was broken for a new facility for the Boys Division, and plans were made to renovate the existing school building for the arrival of the Girls Division on campus in 2004.

In the fall of 2003, the Girls Division opened at St. Catherine's Greek Orthodox Church with 170 freshman and sophomore students. For the 2004-05 school year, the Girls Division moved into their refurbished building on the Campbell Campus, while the Boys Division started classes in their new building on the same campus.

With the addition of the Girls Division, Regis Jesuit became only the second Jesuit school in the world to offer an all-girls education (the other is in the Philippines) and is the only co-divisional Jesuit school in North America.

In February 2014, the Steele Center, containing facilities for the performing arts and communications, as well as a student commons area, opened between the two divisions. Named in honor of Fr. Philip G. Steele, SJ '66, who served as the school's president from 2006-15, and with facilities intended for use by all students, it is both the physical and spiritual heart of the school. A statue of the school's patron, St. John Francis Regis, by Bolivian-born artist, Pablo Eduardo, was installed in front of the Steele Center in October 2016, further enlivening this shared space.

One of the school's strategic objectives, securing the last large piece of open property adjacent to the campus, was accomplished in April 2017 when an additional 18 acres of land was purchased fon the southeast end. Utilization of this additional land was determined through a master planning process finalized in 2020. Conceptual plans are guiding development of the land for athletic use and additional parking.

During the 2017-18 school year, the school's 140th year, Regis Jesuit completed an assessment of its organizational framework and began moving to a structure with one principal overseeing academic and affective programming with the support of several cross-divisional administrators. With the goals of streamlining communications and decision-making and imrpoving the single-sex educational experience, this new structure went into effect during the summer of 2018 and achieved full steady-state operational mode by 2020.

In 2019, Regis Jesuit launched *Inspire & Ignite 2025*, its strategic vision for access, innovation and excellence to guide our continued progress forward. A major initiative of this plan was brougt to fruition with the opening of the school's Science & Innovation Center in January 2024. This building brings our science disciplines into a centralized state-of-the-art space for use by all students in single-sex classes, as well as serves as the school's new front door and home to the Admissions Welcome Center, McCallin Alumni Center, Our Lady of the Way Chapel and President's Office.
